

Vocational and other student body clubs provide an important augmentation to the educational program of students. Through participation in vocational and/or ASB clubs such as D.E.C.A., students acquire a deeper understanding of business concepts. Such business functions as sales, marketing, retailing, pricing, and taking of inventory can be effectively taught through the operation of a high school student store.

Monies generated through student stores are ASB funds and handling of such funds must be consistent with state law and regulation relating to such funds.

- 1. To promote a positive school climate and strong school spirit.
- 2. To provide students with a deeper understanding of business concepts.
- 3. To facilitate the sale of certain approved items, including designated school articles and emblems.

It is the policy of the Peninsula school board to endorse the operation of student stores at secondary schools in the district; provided, that they are specifically tied to the secondary school curriculum, that sale items are of general interest and value to the members of the student body and approved by the building principal, that all regulations of the state and the district's business office be followed in the management, accounting and auditing of the funds, that the inventory on hand at any one time shall not exceed the sum of \$8,000, and that the sale of any food items shall comply with the competitive food rule promulgated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The Superintendent of his/her designee shall ensure that all student stores comply with the cash management procedures required by the Washington Administrative Code and the school district.
